Report of the Music Department Dr. Oksana Glouchko, Cantor

I have been humbled to hear from so many congregants on how musical programming at St. Stephen's has, in some way, spoken to their life and well-being in 2019. Indeed, music can serve as a conduit through which healing, encouragement, and revelation can happen.



I'm so grateful to those of you who continue to give of your time, talents and resources to Musical programming here at St. Stephen's, and it's especially touching to witness how music is now reaching more people in the city of Wilmington through our Concert Series, now in its second year, which offers all programming free to the public.

Highlights include:

- Continuing the formation of our growing Choir. In Fall 2018, the council approved to have four paid section leaders/ soloists to join our choir. This commitment greatly enhances and supports the quality of musical offerings on Sundays and special events. In September 2019, we welcomed into our musical family soprano Jazmin Salaberrios, countertenor Malcom Richardson, tenor Leon DeShields, and baritone Nicholas Calabrese.
- Christmas and Easter Services: With many hands on-board and united, these events created beautiful memories and meaningful opportunities for greater connection among members of our ministry.
- Now in its second year, *Concerts at St. Stephen's* (our primary musical outreach initiative) presents seven concerts this season featuring artists from The Metropolitan Opera, The University of Delaware, The Peabody Conservatory, Furman University, The University of



Trinidad, Tel-Aviv University and the Haifa Symphony in Israel. To commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the Auschwitz liberation, our last three concerts of the season usher an interfaith perspective featuring Jewish artists. In its belief that beautiful music is an inherent part of community worship, inspiring, and enhancing our appreciation of the glory of God, St. Stephen's is committed to offering all events free of charge and open to the general public. Donations from several congregants and funds collected from our free-will donation basket continue to subsidize the humble honorariums we offer our artist as well as other miscellaneous expenses related to post-concert reception and publicity materials.

• Improvements on the regular maintenance of our organ and piano.

Below is a list of a few goals for this coming year:

- 1. Recruitment: We are always eager to hear from people to consider getting involved with our ministry in some capacity.
- 2. Concert Series: With the continued success of this outreach initiative, we will soon begin planning for *Concerts at St. Stephen's* 2020-2021 season.
- 3. Organ Repair: Pastor Churchill and the council continue to discuss how we may begin to invest in the actual repair process of our historically significant instrument. It may be a lengthy journey, but one that, for many reasons, is necessary.
- 4. Musical Repertoire: In honoring the positions of St. Stephen's mission and musical history, we will continue to re-discover forgotten musical masterpieces and welcome newer excellent music in a way that broadens our scope.

Report of the Office Administrator

As a child, I loved stories. Fairy tales, mysteries, adventures, biographies. They all captivated me. They still do. One of the reasons I like my job so much is that I get to share the stories of the people of St. Stephen's and the community that thrives here.

One of the main ways I share stories is through our social media posts on Instagram and Facebook. With the help of our photographers, Ann Warner, and Mike Lehm, I share photos about life at St. Stephen's and in our Lutheran Community Services food pantry. We are blessed with many volunteers, supporters, and donors in our community, and I try to capture that every day.

This year I interviewed volunteers, donors, and clients so they could tell you in their own words what their experiences were. This year we met Caitlin, who organized a food drive with her yoga students, Vince, who



recently moved to Wilmington, who wanted to volunteer at a food pantry and a client who had been eating salsa and croutons for three days.

Their stories inspired our readers to share the posts and reach hundreds of people beyond our followers.

On Facebook, our top three posts were:

- Empty Bowl Dinner video (2,200 people reached)
- Mt. Pleasant High School citrus donation (2,200 people reached)
- Shepherd's Garden reaching 2,031 pounds of vegetable

donations (1,500 people reached)

The post which generated the most clicks was the donation of 800 pounds of pork. There were 301 clicks to see the photos.

On Instagram, we had more than 200 posts and grew our followers from 76 to 122 followers.

I'm learning more ways to share St. Stephen's story through the Delaware-Maryland Synod Communications Team and The Church Network, a professional association for church administrators. I look forward to sharing their ideas with you.

In addition to sharing stories, I support our food pantry. This year more than 100 volunteers served 2,590 hours. Of those volunteers, we have nine members from St. Stephen's who volunteer regularly in the food pantry. They served 397 hours last year. I'm grateful for all the volunteers for their dedication, time, and hard work. They serve families with grace and compassion.

2019 was the first full year we used a web-based program to log in client visits. Instead of getting a written referral for each visit, all clients are now entered into the program. They only need to be entered once to be eligible to receive food from July 1, 2019, to June 30, 2020. This was the easiest renewal we have had.

The program gives us the ability to track the number of families who visit and where they come from. In 2019, we had 9.489 visits serving 17,652 individuals –

13,210 adults and 4,442 children. Many are repeat visitors. The unduplicated individuals served was 2,860.

We mostly serve clients who live close to St. Stephen's - 57.1 percent of the families live 1 mile away, and 21.4 percent live 3 miles away.

In 2019, we went green and stopped buying plastic grocery bags. Instead, we rely on members, volunteers, and the community to donate clean, used plastic bags. We hope to encourage more clients to use reusable bags, but we still need everyone to bring in used plastic bags.

St. Stephen's outreach to the community includes hosting exhibitions of local artists and Art Loop Wilmington receptions on the first Friday of the month. In 2019 we hosted nine exhibitions, including two group shows: students from the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the Pacem in Terris Traveling Youth Peace Art Exhibition, which featured art created by Delaware youth sharing their vision of peace. The artists shared work in alcohol ink, oils, watercolors and pen and ink.

Special thanks to members who provide refreshments at the Art Loop receptions. All the artists are grateful for your kindness in providing refreshments because most galleries do not provide refreshments, and they are responsible for bringing it. We look forward to hosting eight exhibitions in 2020 in March, April, May, June, September, October, November, and December.

In 2020, I look forward to using Tithe.ly, a new church management software program. We will be moving the E-Courier from MailChimp, a web-based program to Tithe.ly. It also has the ability to register guests for events, which will make payment for the Empty Bowl Dinner easier.

Thank you to everyone who volunteers in the food pantry, in the office, and at all our events. I look forward to another amazing year at St. Stephen's!

Not only the St. Stephen's family, but many community members and establishments have attended. The Bowl dinner continues to help our food ministries.

Social Ministries continues to be a strong outreach at St. Stephen's. We continue to support Emmanuel Dining Room monthly by serving a meal during lunch, Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center with our Backpack ministry and Christmas gifts for the children, Family Promise Ministry, and our LCS Food Pantry. Our food pantry is vital to the community and we continue to help those challenged by the need for food. God has provided the strength we need to keep serving. We also held a "Noisy Change" collection campaign to support the World Hunger Relief Fund. We provided a bowling team to bowl in the annual Lutheran Volunteer Corp. bowl- a –thon. Several members also ran/walked in the annual LCS Run, the first time in many years we have had a team representing St. Stephen's. Also, the Art Loop has added much to our outreach. We also sponsored a booth in Dover at the Delaware Pride Week activities. Not only are we a Reconciling in Church, but we are continuing to live up to our calling of being inclusive in all areas of God's work through the strength we receive from God.

In 2019 our weekly attendance average was 54. We welcomed nine new members into the St. Stephen's family, held two baptisms and sadly lost three very active long-time members. They were Fred Altergott, Kathleen Marshall and Lydia Turner.

Our LEAD program completed our second year. They have been hard at work meeting with community members, during more congregational assessments to help us establish how to proceed into the future as God gives us strength.

A very special thank you to our office administrator, Kanchalee Reeves. Her dedication to St. Stephen's is phenomenal and helps our congregation to function smoothly. Kanchalee's help and patience through the year has been deeply appreciated. Also, thank you to our sexton, Bonnie Kincaid and our assistant sexton Armand Schmidt for their hard work. They help to keep out facility bright and clean during the year. The work they do has blessed us.

Lastly, I want to thank Pastor Jason Churchill. Your steadfast leadership and devotion to St. Stephen's is unmatched. You display a total devotion to the congregation and community. Altar Guild

Altar Guild is responsible for the care of the worship space. This includes the placement of the furnishings, appointments, and ornaments used during the worship service. Altar Guild members, with the help of non-members, also decorate the Sanctuary for high holy days, such as Christmas and Easter.

Our group is small, and we had a rough year due to retirements and member requests for limited scheduling. However, by the end of the year, we had four new members. We also have our first gentleman member!! That is groundbreaking – joining a ministry team that has only ever been the realm of women.

Thank you, Pr. Jason, for all your support of this ministry team. Thank you to the congregation also for your help decorating for Christmas and Easter and other times when there are calls for help.

Experience is not necessary to join Altar Guild. The time commitment is small. The preparation process has been streamlined over the past few years. Our goal is to be easy and efficient but correct. One example is the change to the altar flowers. Several factors went into the decision to change this process, but even with the change, we continue to have flowers on Sunday.

We pair two members up who meet Sunday morning for about 15 minutes to prepare the Altar and Chancel for worship. After the service, they reverse the process. This takes about 15-20 minutes also.



Altar Guild also provides the communion bread. Our two options are to bake a loaf of bread or pick up pita bread from the grocery store. We also have purchased gluten-free wafers available. If you don't think "full membership" in Altar Guild is right for you, but you like to bake – we have a place for you!

Property Team


The property team members who volunteered their time this year are Gary Gooden, Jane Conlon, Chuck Landry, Chris Poslock, John Rodammer, Doug Small, Robert Sullivan, Ken Nicholson, and Sonia Brode.

The team completed several repairs and improvements to our church facility. The following list, in no particular order, is a brief synopsis of those projects.

- The fire escape from the baptistery on the 13th Street side of the church was repainted, along with the metal rails at various points around the building.
- The exterior wood frames around the stained-glass windows on both sides of the sanctuary were repainted. The original paint had begun to peel, exposing the wood to weathering and rot. The fresh paint will protect the wood for many years to come.
- The stone around the main entrance to the narthex and sanctuary, and the stone walls around the front ground floor entrance were repointed. For the past several years, we have been repointing areas mostly around the original church building. This project is a normal part of maintaining a hundred-year-old building and will continue for the next several years.
- An intermittent leak in the sanctuary near the piano was repaired, but we are not satisfied that the repair was done properly. We may need to have this redone later.
- The roof over the front stairwell had deteriorated and had begun to leak. That small section of roof was replaced, so it should be secure for many years to come.
- The roof over Fredrick Memorial Hall had been a problem for many years because it was not installed properly. Early this fall, we inspected the roof and found that portions had deteriorated so badly that we were concerned that it would not make it through the winter without failing and causing serious damage. We asked for bids and were able to engage a contractor who replaced the black roof with a white membrane and more efficient insulation that will end the periodic water damage we have suffered over

the years. As an added benefit, it will save on future heating and cooling bills.

- Gary Gooden repainted both outer doors in front of the church, the main entrance to the narthex, and the ground level entrance near the food pantry. He also painted the emergency door in the baptistery, which leads to the fire escape.
 When you see him, thank him for his effort.
- One unfortunate incident occurred while the Fredrick Memorial Hall roof was being repaired. Someone vandalized the project over the Thanksgiving Day weekend. Rain that Sunday caused damage to the



building. Fortunately, the roofing contractor responded quickly to our call, and the leaking was stopped. ServPro came in and dried the building, leaving no trace of mold or smell. We are awaiting bids to repair the drywall damage, and expect to be able to repair the drywall damage before spring. Insurance coverage has not yet been resolved.

- For the last two years, we have been repairing and replacing the emergency lights throughout the building. Ken Nicholson just finished the last of that work, so thank him when you see him.
- Last on our list, but certainly, not least is the repair and painting that was done by several of our members to the walls around the food pantry and the atrium outside the social hall. The heavy traffic around the food pantry had taken its toll on the walls, leaving them damaged and pretty ugly. Jane Conlon organized the team and coordinated the project. I don't have the names of all the people who volunteered, but certainly, Jane deserves our thanks

We want to thank all of those who helped and supported our efforts this year, and we look forward to more progress this year.



Food Pantry




The first chart shows that St. Stephen's serves the highest number of families, partly because it is open five days a week.

LEAD

We have finished the second of three years of the LEAD program. LEAD stands for Living Every Day as Disciples. LEAD is a synod-sponsored program to encourage congregations to grow in their connection with the community.

Team members are Bob Linderman, Michele Torchia, Karleen Strayer, Ann Warner, and Jason Churchill. The focus of LEAD training in the first two years is listening: listening to God in the Bible and prayer, listening to the congregation, and listening to the community.

Over the last few months, LEAD members have been able to share some of those insights with the congregation through articles in the e-Courier and presentations during the worship service. We've been working behind the scenes for quite a while, but it's time to make the congregation more fully aware of what we have been doing, and what we will be doing.

In 2018 team focused on Bible study and listening to the congregation. We heard from the congregation through a survey in spring 2018, and conversations around meals in fall 2018.

In 2019 the team concentrated on listening to the



community. We have had conversations with several community leaders: a school board member, a bank manager, a state legislator, the director of Planned Parenthood, and the director of Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center. There are many more on our list that we want to talk with, but this has been a good start.

The next task for the LEAD team is to take the information we have gathered and see how the pieces fit together. How does God's message to us fit with the vision of the congregation? How does the vision of the congregation fit with the needs of the community?

Based on the information we have gathered, the LEAD team will be proposing some "adaptive experiments." The experiments will involve the congregation and allow people to see in what ways our congregation can change and grow in supporting our mission to be in the community.

During 2020, the LEAD team will also be asking members of the congregation to form a Centering Team. This is one of the final steps of the LEAD program. The LEAD team has been listening, the Centering Team, the council, and our mission teams will be asked to do. The adaptive experiments will give a sense of what we can do as a congregation, and how well it fits into the needs of the community. Council and mission teams can then continue to make plans based on that information, with the Centering Team serving as the liaison between Council and the congregation.

There is an article by Chuck Lawless (<u>chucklawless.com</u>) which nicely sums up what LEAD is doing, and what we will be asking the congregation to do.

Here is a summarized version of the Lawless article 9 Markers of Churches who Strongly Influence Their Community With the Gospel.

- 1. They believe and teach the gospel.
- 2. They're not typically megachurches.
- 3. They genuinely ask, "If our church weren't here, would our community miss us?"
- 4. They ask community leaders what their community's real needs are.
- 5. Their members (beginning with the pastor) have chosen to live in the community.
- 6. They welcome all races and nationalities.
- 7. They often have one staff member or leader responsible for local outreach and ministry.
- 8. They almost naturally prayerwalk their community.
- 9. They serve, serve again, and then serve some more.

These markers resonated with the LEAD team. Some markers are already a natural part of St. Stephen's. We've taken on some as part of the LEAD program. Others have been part of the planning process.

As we head into the third and final year of the LEAD program, we will be asking the congregation to actively participate in programs that will result in a St. Stephen's congregation that is even more actively involved in living God's mission in the community.

Worship 2018

Other means of fundraising included a Visa



gift card from Thrivent (donated by Jon and Kathy Wagner) and several other donations making this a wonderful night that was enjoyed by all.

On Wednesday, October 23, a small team of volunteers opened the doors of the St. Stephen's social hall and invited food pantry clients to a Soup and Bread dinner, at which over 50 people were able to enjoy a hot meal. There was plenty of soup, bread, and desserts, so each client was able to take home a doggie bag as they left. In the end, we still had soup,

bread, and desserts leftover, some of which were given to the food pantry to give to clients, as well as the delivery of more than five gallons of assorted soups to the Sunday Breakfast Mission.

LVC Bowl-a-thon

Each spring the local Lutheran Volunteer Corps group hosts a bowl-a-thon to benefit the program. St. Stephen's regularly sends a team of bowlers.

Lutheran Volunteer Corps is a program providing volunteers the opportunity to work with social-service agencies, while living in community with other volunteers.

Emmanuel Dining Room

On the 25th of each month (except December), St. Stephen's provides the lunchtime meal for approximately 200 individuals at Emmanuel Dining Room, located at the corner of Third & Walnut Streets in Wilmington, Delaware. St. Stephen's joins dozens of other churches and businesses in Wilmington, who provide this service for the hungry and homeless in the city. The average daily attendance for this meal is 175 to 225 people of all ages, including families with children.

Sharon and Dave Potter coordinate the volunteers from St. Stephen's who purchase and deliver the food for our monthly day of service, as well as provide desserts and help to serve the food. It is ideal to provide three servers/helpers each month, but unfortunately, we often fall short of that number. Volunteers who serve are needed from 11:45 am to 1:00 pm on the 25th of each month.

Volunteers are always needed, and cash donations are also needed to cover the cost of purchasing the food for this important ministry. The cost of the food for this meal is approximately \$200-\$225 per month, which is supported by our church budget and donations from within our congregation. As little as \$1 per EDR guest can be used to provide this meal – please consider helping!

Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center

Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center is located a mile from St. Stephen's and offers a variety of preschool and after-school programs for children in the neighborhood. We sponsored three projects to benefit Hilltop this past year:

- **Backpacks for school** We were able to provide 30 backpacks, each containing school supplies which were filled at church and delivered to the center for distribution to the children.
- Thanksgiving baskets These are not baskets (because of the number of items contained in each), but boxes with food items (minus the turkey) necessary for a family holiday feast. We provided 30 boxes.



• Christmas Gifts – We provide a list of children with two gifts each for the holiday. Each child requested one specific toy and provided their clothing size. These were items that the children would otherwise have to go without.

Lynn Splittorff works with Hilltop to coordinate our participation in these activities.

<u>New Jerusalem</u>

We continue to provide worship space for New Jerusalem Missionary Baptist Church, which was destroyed by fire in December 2015. They have been worshiping here since February 2016.

Family Promise

Family Promise NCC envisions a community in which every family has a home, a livelihood, and the resources for lasting independence. There are 800 volunteers and over 40 congregations that help this organization assist over 100 families to end their homelessness faster, more successfully, and more cost-effective than anywhere else in Delaware.

St. Stephen's makes and serves dinner for families staying overnight at Westminster Presbyterian. This has been a job primarily done by Jane Conlon. Additional volunteers are welcome.

We support Family Promise by donating a portion of our fundraising from Empty Bowl Dinner.

The next Highmark Walk for a Healthy Community, which provides support to Family Promise, will be held at the Tubman-Garrett Park on June 13, 2020.

Bootless Stageworks and St. Stephen's have been partners since the spring of 2014. The partnership has resulted in material improvements to the Social Hall. Bootless continues its mission of providing challenging stage presentations. Offerings in 2019 included comedy nights, open mic nights, *Disenchanted!, Close Your Legs Honey, An Evening of Everything, Spice Girls Drag Tribute, Johnny Depp: A Retrospective, You've God Red on You, Murderess,* and *Calendar Girls.*

Food Ministries

Food Pantry

The Lutheran Community Services (LCS) Food Pantry at St. Stephen's is one of the busiest food pantries in the state of Delaware. We provide three days of emergency food provision to 800-1000 families each month. The largest source of pantry food is the Food Bank of Delaware.

Additional food comes from a contract with USDA, which delivers 11 months of the year. Private donations from churches and schools are another source of food for the pantry. St. Stephen's Second Sunday contributions of food help make it possible for us to serve our clients with a healthy variety of meat, vegetables, fruits, cereals, and pasta.

The pantry is open five days a week: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, 9-12, and Wednesday evening, 5-7.



Volunteers staff the pantry. We are a source of volunteer opportunities for other churches, businesses, schools, and neighborhood residents. Chuck Landry provides oversight and training of the volunteers.

Second Sunday

Second Sunday reminds us of the abundant blessings we receive from God. We encourage the congregation to donate nonperishable food on the second Sunday of each month. These collected items are used to restock the shelves of the food pantry. If everyone participated, whether by bringing one item or a bag of food, the impact on our food pantry would be wonderful. Although many people think of the hungry during the months between November and January, the needs of the hungry are all year.

Food Packing

Each Monday and Wednesday, volunteers pack bags, stock shelves, and clean our food pantry; so that the volunteers who operate the pantry during its service hours can distribute the food more efficiently. Also, this cleaning, restocking, and pre-packing enables us to serve more people, and the lines can be kept to a minimum. Volunteers include St. Stephen's members and members of the community.

World Hunger Fundraiser

This year we participated in raising funds for the ELCA World Hunger program. Through "noisy change" collections on two Sundays in the spring, we raised over \$500. This money was added to the donations of other churches throughout the synod at the Synod Assembly.

Kitchen Renovation Project

The kitchen renovation project has a blueprint of the design. After a presentation to the Food Bank of Delaware, we are now working together to become a shared venture to expand the project design to include the kitchen as a teaching and feeding location. This will help connect the clients of the food pantry with an opportunity to learn as well as provide cooked meals for their family.

Although final implementation of this project is in the future, we are very hopeful that we can create a space that the marries together our feeding ministries.

We are looking forward to the future.

Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center

2019 was a year of renovation and upgrades at Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center! All planned capital improvement campaign projects were completed. Equipment that ranged from 20 to 30 years old was replaced. The 24-year-old playground and the 30-year-old gym roof were replaced. The fire panel and approximately 25 windows that were over twenty-five-year-old were also replaced. Renovations were made to the 30-year-old main kitchen. Contributions from Welfare Foundation, Crystal Trust Foundation, and the Crestlea Foundation made the renovations and upgrades possible.

The Lutheran Churches continued to be the backbone of overall agency operations. Funding from individual churches continued to be a major asset to overall operations. Representatives from local churches continued to serve as Board members. The churches provided complete Thanksgiving baskets to over 250 families. In addition, they, along with the City of Wilmington, Toys for Tots, and Parents of African Americans at Tower Hill School (PAATHS), helped to make it possible to provide Christmas gifts to over 200 Hilltop children.

The Early Childhood Education Program continued to operate five days a week from 7:00 am through 5:30 pm. Our partnerships with the University of Delaware's New Directions Early Head Start program, the State of Delaware's Department of Education Early Childhood Assistance Program(ECAP), Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), the State of Delaware's Department of Services for Children Youth and their Families (Office

of Child Care Licensing), Division of Social Services (Purchase of Care), Delaware Stars for Early Success, United Way of Delaware, Red Clay Consolidated School District, and the Foster Grandparent Program made it possible for Hilltop to provide these programs to infants, toddlers, preschool children, and their families.

Hilltop's Youth Services Program for school-age children continued to provide educational enhancement activities and a safe haven for our participants. The services include: before and after school



care for children ages 5-12, summer camp, and an evening program for children ages 9 through 18 years of age.

These programs were made possible through the State of Delaware's Grant in Aid Program, the Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families (Extended Hours Program and the Office of Child Care Licensing), Division of Social Services (Purchase of Care), the State of Delaware's Criminal Justice Council, Delaware Stars for Early Success, the State of Delaware's Department of Education (Child and Adult Care Food Program), the City of Wilmington's Department of Parks and Recreation, Laffey McHugh, Kenny Family Foundation and the Summer Learning Collaborative.

Our goals for 2020 include: maintaining and increasing overall funding, beginning the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) accreditation process, developing a scholarship program to support families, increasing the endowment fund to offer scholarships for college-bound students, increasing the number of Hilltop students going to college and enhancing community development programs.

Thank you to all of the organizations, churches, programs, and foundations that support the children and families of the Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center! We look forward to your continued support in 2020 to continue our mission.

Each year, 1 in 30 children in Delaware experience homelessness. These are families like Brittney's, pictured here. Brittney left Delaware to follow her former husband to Missouri with the hope he would fulfill his promise to "change." She quickly found out that the violence only grew worse and her life and the lives of her children were in constant danger.



Like any other parent, Brittney did everything she could to keep her children safe. She filed

a "Protection From Abuse" and for divorce. Her now ex-husband, in retaliation emptied their join bank account, leaving Brittney penniless and nowhere to go in an unfamiliar state. Rather than return to her abuser Brittney fought on for the safety of herself and her children.

Supporters like you gave Brittney a safe haven: Family Promise®

NNCC. She could keep her family together while receiving safe shelter, home-cooked meals, and warm hospitality. Just as her abuser was granted visitation in Missouri despite her PFA, Brittney returned to Delaware with her children and entered the Hospitality Network. Brittney got sole custody of her children, her old job as a Paraprofessional back, and quickly moved into housing. Brittney says she is "forever grateful for all of the love, support and shelter that was provided to me".

The students inspire me, challenge me, and increase my hope in the midst of a world that often brings dire news. Their hearts for service, their earnest care for one another, and their desire to grow in faith in Jesus, all while sharing deeply and openly with each other, is a true joy to see. This year we are blessed by an international element to our group, including graduate students from Tanzania and Brazil. What a wonderful reminder of the global nature of the body of Christ in the world!

This spring, we said farewell and Godspeed to <u>nine</u> amazing graduates, Chris, Greta, Hannah, Jacob, Janelle, Kayla, Larissa, Leah, and Maria, many of whom had been core members of LCM throughout their college experience. Their long-term investment in LCM and FISH blessed our ministry, and they are much missed as they pursue graduate studies, begin their vocational journeys, and travel the world in their lives beyond UD.

Some of the highlights of 2019 included a student retreat at Hack's Point, Maryland in the spring; our Senior Honor Night at the chapel in May; an ecumenical hayride in November; and our Advent celebrations, including Tuesday worship, with the bishop presiding. LCM students gather weekly for dinners, worship, thoughtful discussions, and Bible study; this fall, we resumed our study of the Gospel of Mark. LCM members remain active in service, volunteering with FISH (our monthly food program, in cooperation with Lutheran Community Services and St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Newark) and helping with your congregation's Empty Bowl dinner in

the fall. This year, the students were excited to provide financial support for Empty Bowl as well, by means of their stewardship of the interest from the ministry's endowment account. Our student Executive Board members and Peer Ministers work beautifully together to plan events, to encourage and support one another, to oversee the student group's finances, and to influence and bless others' lives through their service and leadership on campus, with FISH, and in the wider world. I am grateful for the opportunity to know them, as well as to work and worship beside them.

Our LCM fall fundraiser was hosted this past



November by Grace Lutheran Church in Hockessin. Bishop Bill Gohl joined us as our keynote speaker, sharing his characteristic humor, warmth, and advocacy for campus ministry. It was wonderful to see the spirit of camaraderie and fellowship that evening, with nine different congregations represented in our midst, as well as many LCM alumni returning to join us for the event. We were both grateful and excited to raise over \$15,000 through donations and pledges. What a blessing!

Our ministry succeeds because of teamwork and shared care, which was highlighted this spring during our Ministry Site Review. The review team celebrated the many contributors who cooperate in tending to the needs of LCM at UD: our gifted and deeply committed Ministry Site Coordinator, JoAnne Gross; our faithful Directing Committee and FISH Committee members; our great student leaders; our invested alumni; the generous members of local congregations who prepare meals, provide financial support, and keep us in prayer; and our openhanded and deeply appreciated donors. In addition, we are truly blessed to have a supportive bishop and synod, who advocate for us and who provide significant grant support.

We are grateful for your congregation's ongoing support for the sake of this ministry with and among amazing students, to the glory of God. Please continue to pray that Lutheran Campus Ministry can be a welcoming circle for students and a bright light for Christ in our campus community and beyond!

Beyond the Wall: Making All Things New



hen have you discovered newness in life through Christ? Did you have to step out in faith to do so? Perhaps you had to let go of your will and accept God's will. This

is a major turning point in the faith journey of many people. There are examples in Scripture about Job (Job 29-30), Elijah (I Kings 19:4-14), Mary Magdalene (Luke 8:1-2) and the women at the tomb (Luke 23:55 – 24:5). Consider the story of the rich young man (Matthew 19:16-26, Mark 10:17-31, Luke 18:18-30). He approached Jesus with a simple question: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus replied, "Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." When the young man heard this, he was very sad and walked away, because he was very rich. Given the choice, he found it difficult to forsake wealth in this world for the promise of God and eternal life.

Sometimes there are barriers or walls that complicate trying something new or stepping out in faith. What walls or barriers have you encountered? Consider the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), who wanted to witness Jesus preaching but was too short to see past the crowd. After Zacchaeus climbed a tree, Jesus called out to him and invited himself to lunch in Zacchaeus' home. We know what Jesus said to Zacchaeus, and he was a different person afterward. He had changed from wanting wealth and success in this world to desiring significance through a life of faith. When have you, or your congregation, chosen success over significance? Perhaps when using numbers or the size of your facilities as a measure. Moving toward significance usually means sacrificing success. In what areas of ministry is your congregation seeking significance today?


Stepping out in faith may be a personal choice for a short time but usually involves accompanying others. As members in the body of Christ, we are not called to meet our own needs alone. The Great Commission (Matthew 28:16-20) calls us to go beyond our barriers and bring the message of Jesus Christ to others. This helps us grow beyond a Christian enclave to become servants of Christ and a serving community. In what ways has your congregation moved from an enclave to a servant community?

Overcoming barriers and walls to make things new involves stepping out in faith. It means shaking loose from lethargy and moving out from sheltered comfort. In the process we break the chains of sin that hold us back and divide us from making us one in Christ. When we share in the distress of God's heart to do the kingdom's work, we are in tune with God's will, choosing significance over success and becoming a servant community.
